**REVIEW OF NORTH CAROLINA'S STATUTE AND QUESTIONS RELATED
TO POOLING NATIONALLY**

Ms. Lynne Weaver of Attorney General's Office, Division of Consumer Protection gave an overview of S.L. 2012-143 , the Department of Justice's report on hydraulic fracturing, and current North Carolina law on pooling. Ms. Weaver also reviewed the rationales and concerns about pooling and the recommendations made by the Consumer Protection Division including that the Commission consider (1) the percentage of required voluntary agreement of acreage in a pooling or drilling unit, (2) requiring operators to make fair and reasonable offers to landowners, (3) requiring surface owner agreement to surface operations or compensation for surface damages, and (4) requiring the inclusion of a statutory "Pugh" clause in leasing agreements.

PRESENTATION ON GEOLOGY AND HYDRAULIC FRACTURING

Dr. Kenneth Taylor gave a brief presentation on the scientific rationale behind forced pooling and the processes to remove hydrocarbons from non-porous rock. Dr. Taylor also explained that North Carolina law was written to address the removal of conventional oil.

REVIEW OF STAFF'S RESEARCH TO DATE

Ms. Trina Ozer introduced Ms. Layla Cummings as a new member of the Division of Energy, Mineral, and Land Resources (DEMLR). Ms. Cummings will assist the Compulsory Pooling Study Group with research and comparison of pooling statutes in other states.

DISCUSSION OF SCHEDULE, SCOPE OF WORK, AND NEXT STEPS

Chairman Covington reviewed five objectives that should be covered by the Study Group, as follows: (1) policy goals for compulsory pooling; (2) stakeholder participation; (3) standards for pooling; (4) process for pooling; and (5) terms of compulsory pooling leases.

Chairman Covington outlined a general timeline for the written report of the Study Group. The deadline to deliver the report to the legislature is October 1, 2013. Thus, a draft of the report should be completed by May and a wrap-up of the Study Group's findings should be presented at the September meeting of the MEC.

Chairman Covington suggested that future meetings should be held at the Agricultural Extension Center in Lee County. This location is centrally located and will facilitate the education and engagement of local landowners.

After some discussion by the Commissioners, it was decided that the next meeting of the Study Group should be on January 11, 2013 between 9:00 am and 12:00 pm. James Robinson of RAFI and John Humphrey of The Humphrey Law Firm will give presentations.

Chairman Covington adjourned the meeting.
